## Mentorship

Do you want to make a positive impact on your community? Are you proud of the path you have taken to get where you are and want to share your story with youth?

Be a mentor.

Building Intercultural Resilience Mentorship Program (BIRM) is seeking post-secondary students from all backgrounds and all colleges to deliver mentorship programming for Indigenous high school students in Saskatoon. If you are passionate about inspiring, guiding, and collaborating with youth while building your knowledge and experience with Indigenous peoples and cultures, you may be eligible to be a mentor.

From September to April, mentors make weekly visits at BIRM high schools to develop relationships with and support post-secondary pathways for Indigenous youth. The program is very rewarding for volunteers as it provides an opportunity to create impactful change, develop valuable professional skills (leadership, public speaking, collaboration) and deepens their understanding of Indigenous cultures and identities.

If you would like to be part of the program, please consider the following requirements:

- Mentors must be available for 2 hours every week during the school year (following the USask calendar) and this is not a drop-in program. That means making time outside of your sessions for studying, homework, appointments, and other activities. Sessions are scheduled around student class schedules, and we will never ask you to miss class to attend.
- Successful applicants will have some experience learning about the historical and cultural landscape of Indigenous peoples in Canada.
- Successful applicants will have some experience working with youth, or at least a strong interest in working with youth.
- Mentor selections are made to create as diverse a grouping as possible. This includes ethnicity, spirituality, gender, age, college, and interests/skills!
- This is an unpaid volunteer position. (Students who attend the University of Saskatchewan may be eligible for a co-curricular record entry.)

Edward Mirasty, a Cree member of the Lac La Ronge Indian Band, has over 32 years of education. He served as Director of Education at the PA Grand Council for 17 years, has coauthored 11 books, and received the 2011 Sask. Aboriginal Literacy Award.
